Attendance

Attendance, as always, is a priority. Learning in school is the best way we can support your child. We continue to strive for 95% attendance for every child and have a number of support strategies we can use to help your child attain this target.

If your child has an unavoidable absence, it is imperative that they catch up with all missed work, through the monitoring of Google classroom, emailing staff and also using online resources such as BBC Bitesize.

Punctuality to school is also crucial to both success and the wellbeing of pupils. Registration begins promptly at **0835** with pupils being allowed on site from **0815**. If a pupil arrives after registration or morning assembly, they must first report to the attendance team in the Head of Year's office before going to lesson 1.

Core subject information

Science at Key Stage 3

Our aims:

To develop ambitious, capable learners in Science who...

- undertake **research and evaluate** critically what they find;
- can **explain the ideas** and concepts they are learning about;
- understand how to **interpret data** and apply mathematical concepts;
- use digital technologies creatively to **communicate, find and analyse information**.

General information:

We get pupils to showcase their best work and assessments in a '**Key Task**' book that will include a wide range of assessment types that give all an opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge and skills. These assessments range from science investigations; end of topic tests; literacy/numeracy rich tasks; and digital competency tasks. In addition, pupils will apply what they have learnt in novel and highly motivating STEM lessons and thematic projects such as Mission Rainforest (Y7), Saving a baby Kangaroo (Y8), and Keep the pizza hot! (Y9). Pupils will also have a '**Classwork/Homework**' book - Homework 20 can be done in the back of the book.

Pupils will also get to experience a variety of practical activities which play such an important role in making Science enjoyable and interesting. These activities also help develop a pupil's understanding of many key concepts.

Mathematics at Key Stage 3

Mathematics is a subject that all students can do well in, and the Maths department in St Cenydd are fully committed to help all students develop a love, respect and appreciation for mathematical concepts. Maths is not only an important school subject where Numeracy skills are needed in other subjects but an essential subject for life. We know that students will achieve their best with encouragement and support from home.

Assessments

Pupils in KS3 are assessed regularly through teacher assessments. The work that is used to reach a judgment is from class work and how much support they need, homework and tests.

Tests will be part of normal timetabled lessons. Dates of tests can be found below.

- Week beginning 19th September National Procedural Test
- Week beginning 17th October Maths Test 1
- Week beginning 12th December Maths Test 2
- Reasoning Tests One to be completed every half term (calculator needed)
- Week beginning 1st May National Reasoning Tests
- Week beginning 19th June End of Year Tests

Equipment

The Maths department are selling scientific calculators for £4 and Maths sets for £2 (which include a metal compass, pencil, eraser, sharpener, 15 cm ruler, 45 and 60 degree set squares, protractor and pen).

Homework

Departmental Homework is set once a fortnight. Pupils may get additional homework set by their class teacher that will also need to be submitted by the deadline. Pupils will need to access homework through Google Classroom or on the school website which their class teacher will show them how to use.

English at Key Stage 3


In lessons your child can expect to develop oracy, reading and writing skills

We will do this by:

- Working through interesting, relevant and challenging Schemes of Work
- 2 formal assessments of oracy, reading and writing.
- Covering and working through a range of fiction and non fiction texts
- Discussing topics including diversity, conflict, choices, quests, relationships and dreams
- Ensuring that all aspects of the national curriculum are covered, developing a broad range of skills to prepare pupils for external examinations at Key Stage 4
- Using regular writing challenges
- Becoming acquainted with the Shakespeare play *Macbeth* and the Novel *Of Mice and Men* by John Steinbeck as an introduction to GCSE English Literature in Year 10.

Assessment procedure:

- Half termly assessments
- Weekly homework to consolidate learning
- National Reading Tests - April 2021
